1. Jail
2. Ignition Interlock and / or Electronic Alcohol Monitoring
3. Random Testing (UA or Breath)
4. Curfews
5. Cognitive Skills
6. Support Groups (AA, NA, etc.)
7. MADD Panel/Victim Impact Panel
8. Community based chemical dependency treatment

ISP ADDITIONAL PROGRAMMING

1. Long term monitoring (LTM; MSA §169A.277)
2. Ignition interlock
3. Electronic home monitoring (EHM)
4. Mental Health Evaluation - Therapy
5. Sentence to Service (STS)

POSSIBLE PROBATION VIOLATIONS

1. Any use of alcohol or mood-altering chemicals.
2. Positive breath/urine sample, refusal to testing, altered/diluted samples
3. Failure to follow curfew.
4. Failure to meet with agent as scheduled.
5. Misrepresentation of any fact or document(s).
6. Failure to attend AA, NA, chemical dependency treatment or aftercare.
7. Driving without a valid driver's license.

PROBATION VIOLATION SANCTIONS

1. Incarceration (jail).
2. Electronic home monitoring (EHM).
3. Increased urinalysis and breath tests.
4. Positive drug test fee.
5. Increased weekly contacts.
6. Reset in previous ISP phases.
7. Referral for updated chemical assessment.
8. Implementation of Court ordered ignition interlock.
9. Community work service (CWS) or Sentence to Service (STS).
10. Revocation of probation and execution of sentence.

Brown County Intensive DWI Supervision Program

Brown County Probation
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PURPOSE

The intensive supervision program (ISP) is a sentencing and probation supervision program alternative for individuals convicted of multiple alcohol-related offenses or whom are struggling with remaining abstinent from mood altering chemicals while being supervised on probation. Any individual deemed appropriate by the probation department/Court can be placed into this program at any time for any duration. This program combines three important elements into one program:

- Accountability**
- Chemical dependency treatment / on-going rehabilitation**
- Immediate sanctions for violations**

CHEMICAL HEALTH EVALUATION AND TREATMENT

All ISP participants will need to have an initial chemical health evaluation and may be referred to a chemical dependency treatment program.

TESTING

Participants will be required to submit frequent samples of urine/breath or saliva to monitor sobriety. Testing is done on a call-in system or as directed by the agent on a random basis. Failure to test, a positive test, a diluted sample, or providing an "altered" test will result in immediate sanctions. A positive drug test fee will be assessed against the participant.

FIELD CONTACTS

Participants will be required to submit to random contacts at home, work, or any place the participant may be located in the community. This includes any time or day of the week to include nights, weekends, and holidays.

PROGRAM PHASES:

Phase I - Jail: Participants move to Phase II upon release from jail.

Phase II - EHM: Length: 30-90 days; varies as needed

- Cooperate with probation officer contacts in the home or office.
- Follow a 10:00 p.m. curfew, unless under house arrest
- No overnights without permission of probation
- Follow drug testing rules
- Attend treatment and follow aftercare recommendations
- Keep current with fines and probation fee payments
- If applicable per statute (LTM), spend 30 days per year *each year* of probation on EHM, or If ordered by the court this may be completed via ignition interlock.
- Movement to Phase III is at the discretion of probation agent and based upon completion of the Phase II components and overall progress.

PHASE III: Length: six months

- Curfew is 11:00 pm
- Attend treatment and follow aftercare recommendations
- No overnights without agent approval
- Cooperate with probation officer contacts in the office and/or home
- Follow drug testing rules
- Attend AA/NA on a weekly basis and verify attendance with agent
- Keep current with fines and probation fee payments
- Movement to Phase IV at the discretion of ISP agent and based upon completion of the Phase III components and overall progress.

PHASE IV: Length: four to six months

- Curfew is 12 Midnight
- May be away from approved residence overnight with prior approval of probation agent.
- Cooperate with probation officer contacts in the office and/or home
- Keep current with fines and fee payments

Note: ISP agent will determine when participant has completed the ISP program and move client to traditional probation supervision.

IGNITION INTERLOCK

The State of Minnesota requires ignition interlock be installed from one up to six years for certain DWI offenses. Check with your agent to determine where you fit. All associated costs of the ignition interlock device are the participant's responsibility. Agent can assist participants with understanding the requirements for the ignition interlock program.
